Reduction and oxidation atmospheric firings, readings, lectures, guest speakers, and field trips are included. This course promotes a lifelong enjoyment of ceramics and all its diverse reflections of human development and the aesthetic qualities that clay possesses. 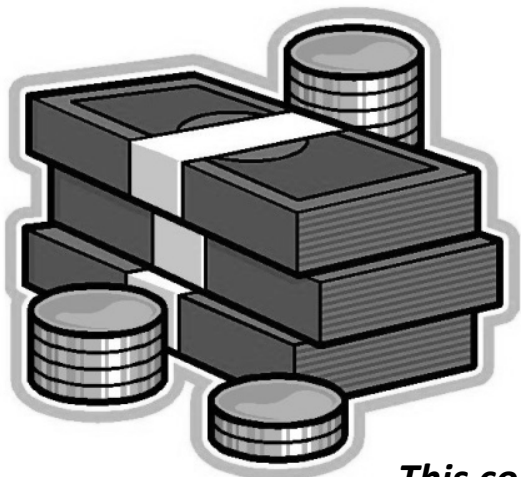
